

## Exploring Digital Dynamics in Netourism: The Linguacultural Impacts of Net-actors on Net-communities

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### Abstract

This study delves into the digital dynamics of netourism (Internet-tourism), emphasizing the linguacultural impacts of net-actors and netiquette on net-communities. Netourism, an emerging phenomenon in the virtual realm, provides a unique context to examine the interconnectedness of language, culture, and online interactions. Guided by the central research question, "How do net-actors influence the netiquettes and linguacultural aspects of communication within net-communities in the context of netourism?", this research investigates the roles of netizens (Internet-citizens), netpats (Internet-expats), and netmads (Internet-nomads) as influential net-actors on netour's netiquette (Internet-etiquette), communication practices, language use, and cultural exchange within net-communities. Using a mixed-methods approach, the study combines qualitative and quantitative methods, including online surveys, in-depth interviews, and discourse analysis, to gather insights from diverse net-actors and net-communities engaged in netourism. This comprehensive approach aims to capture the multifaceted experiences, perspectives, and linguistic-cultural impacts within this dynamic digital landscape. The study contributes valuable insights to sociolinguistics, digital communication, and tourism studies by examining the interplay between linguistic and cultural dimensions in netourism. The discourse analysis revealed diverse linguistic patterns, including code-switching, language borrowing, and linguistic creativity, highlighting the complex language practices within netourism-related net-communities. The findings from this survey revealed several key patterns and trends that provide valuable insights into the research questions. Findings have significant implications for understanding evolving digital dynamics and informing strategies that foster inclusive communication and cultural exchange among diverse net-actors and net-communities. Moreover, the study's outcomes can guide policymakers and practitioners in addressing linguistic and cultural challenges, promoting positive interactions in netourism-related virtual environments.

## 1. Introduction

The advent of digital communication technologies has revolutionized the way individuals interact, leading to the formation of online connections that transcend geographical boundaries. It has impacts on linguistics, including language use, evolution, and cultural exchange. There is large corpus of studies and theories examining various aspects, such as online language practices, virtual communities, and the relationship between technology and language change. Online communication platforms have given rise to unique language practices, such as the use of emojis, abbreviations, and creative syntax (Barton & Lee, 2018). Digital communication technologies have significantly impacted language practices, fostering multilingualism and cross-cultural interactions. Social media platforms have become key arenas for multilingual exchanges, facilitating global cultural connections while also contributing to the dominance of widely spoken languages (Babazade, 2024).

Virtual communities, where individuals form online connections based on shared interests or affiliations, are another critical aspect influencing linguistic practices. Researchers such as Androutsopoulos (2015) focus on the impact of virtual communities on language use, emphasizing the role of cultural contexts and social norms in shaping linguistic practices. Within these communities, members often adopt specific language styles, lexicons, and communication patterns to foster a sense of belonging and group identity.

The influence of technology on language change has been a topic of interest among linguists. Studies by scholars such as Crystal (2011) investigate the connection between technological advancements and language evolution, highlighting the role of digital communication technologies in accelerating language change. Online connections enable rapid dissemination of new words, expressions, and grammatical structures, contributing to the dynamic nature of language in the digital age.

The interconnectedness of online communities fosters linguistic and cultural exchange, leading to the evolution of communication norms. Studies show that users in online communities follow a two-stage lifecycle: an innovative learning phase followed by a conservative phase (Danescu-Niculescu-Mizil et al., 2013). This dynamic process facilitates the emergence of collective identities and linguistic convergence among diverse groups (Cassell & Tversky, 2006). The concept of "networked multilingualism" describes how digital connectivity shapes multilingual practices, influenced by technological mediation, network resources, and audience orientation (Androutsopoulos, 2015). These online interactions can lead to linguistic-cultural hybridity, as seen in Filipino communities engaging with Korean dramas, resulting in glocalized syncretism and cultural synergy (Palileo, 2024). As individuals engage with diverse cultures through online connections, they adopt and adapt new linguistic elements to enrich their communicative repertoire. This cross-cultural exchange contributes to the evolution of language and fosters mutual understanding among diverse linguistic groups.

## 2. Literature Review

The rapid evolution of digital technologies and the exponential growth of the internet have also transformed various aspects of our lives, including how we engage with and experience tourism. The rise of netourism – a term that combines "internet" and "tourism" – has redefined traditional tourism practices by introducing novel ways of exploring destinations, engaging with cultures, and fostering virtual communities. This emerging phenomenon provides a unique lens through which to examine the interconnectedness of language, culture, and online interactions within the context of virtual tourism experiences.

Central to the dynamics of netourism are the roles of net-actors, such as netizens (internet citizens), netpats (internet expats), and netmads (internet nomads), who actively shape communication practices, language use, and cultural exchange within net-communities. The netiquette of net-communities, or the set of norms and guidelines governing online behavior specific to these communities, is influenced by the presence and interactions of these diverse net-actors.

This research seeks to investigate the linguistic and cultural impacts of net-actors on the netiquette of net-communities in the context of netourism. By exploring the diverse experiences, perspectives, and communication practices of these actors, this study aims to contribute valuable insights to the fields of sociolinguistics, digital communication, and tourism studies. Furthermore, the findings of this research can inform strategies for fostering inclusive communication and cultural exchange within netourism-related virtual environments.

Guided by the central research question, "How do net-actors influence the netiquettes and linguacultural aspects of communication within net-communities in the context of netourism?", this study employs a mixed-methods approach to gather comprehensive insights from diverse net-actors and net-communities engaged in netourism. Combining qualitative and quantitative methods, such as online surveys, in-depth interviews, and discourse analysis, this research aims to capture the complex interplay between linguistic and cultural dimensions in the dynamic digital landscape of netourism.

The exploration of netourism as an emerging field of study necessitates an examination of its various components and their interconnectedness, as well as an investigation of the existing literature on the topic. This literature review will provide a foundation for the proposed research by examining the existing knowledge on netourism, net-actors, netiquette, and linguacultural impacts within net-communities. Building upon this literature, the proposed study aims to contribute new insights into the digital dynamics of netourism and their implications for fostering inclusive communication and cultural exchange among diverse net-actors and net-communities.

Netourism, an emerging concept combining "Internet" and "tourism," focuses on the digital and virtual dimensions of tourism experiences. In this context, net-actors such as netizens, netpats, and netmads play critical roles in shaping the linguacultural landscape of net-communities through their unique communication practices and adherence to netiquette.

Netourism, a relatively new term that combines "internet" and "tourism," encompasses the digital aspects of tourism experiences and has emerged as a popular research subject in recent years. Netourism has significantly impacted the way individuals engage with tourism experiences. The reviewed papers highlight the transformative potential of tourism and technology in shaping travel experiences. Cultural tourism offers immersive interactions that connect visitors with diverse histories and cultures (Richa & Naithani, 2024). Social media and digital technologies are revolutionizing tourism by nurturing new forms of interaction and value creation (Munar et al., 2013). Transformational tourism, an emerging field, explores how travel experiences can lead to personal growth and change, though further research is needed to understand the depth and nature of these transformative processes (Nandasena et al., 2022). The democratization of tourism distribution through technology has the potential to level the playing field for small and medium-sized tourism enterprises, enhancing their competitiveness and sustainability.

Netourism encompasses various aspects, including virtual exploration, sharing travel experiences, and exchanging cultural knowledge. Netourism, a term blending "Internet" and "tourism," has emerged as a novel field of study, centering on the digital and virtual dimensions of tourism experiences. Netourism offers a platform for individuals to access information, participate in cultural exchanges, and experience travel in virtual settings. These online interactions provide a platform for diverse individuals to engage with one another, contributing to the linguacultural dynamics within net-communities. In addition, in a study by Roozafzai (2024 a) has shown that AI-assisted heuristic methods can effectively facilitate the transition from critical to creative thinking.

Virtual tourism has emerged as a significant area of study, offering new possibilities for travel experiences and destination marketing. Immersive technologies, such as virtual and augmented reality, are reshaping the tourism landscape by enhancing virtual experiences and addressing challenges like overtourism and the COVID-19 pandemic (Verma et al., 2022; Godovykh et al., 2022). These technologies enable tourists to access information, participate in cultural exchanges, and experience

destinations virtually (Pratisto et al., 2022). Factors influencing virtual tourism experiences include information quality, technology acceptance, and affective involvement, which can impact tourists' attitudes and behavioral intentions (Godovykh et al., 2022). The evolution of the World Wide Web, from Web 1.0 to Web 5.0, has implications for various tourism stakeholders, including tourists, service providers, and researchers (Tavakoli & Mura, 2020). As virtual tourism continues to develop, there is a need for more comprehensive research that explores the integration of virtual and non-virtual experiences to enhance overall tourist satisfaction (Tavakoli & Mura, 2020; Pratisto et al., 2022).

Net-actors, such as netizens, netpats, and netmads, play crucial roles in shaping communication practices and cultural exchange within net-communities. The internet has become a crucial platform for cultural citizenship, enabling access, visibility, and cultural recognition while also creating tensions between intra- and inter-cultural communication (Goode, 2010). So netizens, or internet citizens, are active participants in online spaces who engage in discussions, share information, and shape online discourse. They actively partake in online discussions and influence discourse. Netpats, or internet expats, are individuals who leverage digital technologies to navigate cross-cultural experiences and maintain connections with their home culture. They leverage digital technologies to retain connections with their home culture. Netmads, or internet nomads, are highly mobile individuals who rely on digital platforms and tools to work, communicate, and experience different cultures. They utilize digital platforms to work, communicate, and experience diverse cultures.

Research indicates that net-actors significantly influence communication practices and cultural exchange within online communities. Influencers, as cultural producers, skillfully build communities around themselves using seductive communication techniques and gradually reshaping community imaginaries (Vagni, 2024). Netizens, as active participants in online discussions, contribute to the discourse and shape the linguistic and cultural environment. Netpats utilize digital technologies to maintain connections with their home culture, further enriching the linguacultural tapestry of net-communities. Netmads exploit digital platforms to work, communicate, and experience diverse cultures, enhancing cultural exchange within virtual tourism environments.

Netiquette refers to the set of norms and guidelines that govern online behavior within net-communities and dictate online conduct within net-communities. Netiquette refers to the guidelines and norms governing online behavior within internet communities (Kayany, 2004; Scheuermann & Taylor, 1997). It encompasses broadly accepted conventions for appropriate conduct across various online platforms, including email, chat rooms, and bulletin boards (Kayany, 2004). Key netiquette principles include thinking before posting, using proper capitalization, avoiding abbreviations, being concise, and refraining from inflammatory language or "flaming" (Scheuermann & Taylor, 1997). Netiquette promotes respectful, harmonious digital communication and can strengthen users' soft skills, contributing to character development (Yulianti, 2022). Politeness serves as the primary regulator of online communicative behavior, with specific practices such as using greetings, addressing others by name, and avoiding excessive emoticons (Ryabova, 2023). While netiquette breaches may not always result in direct consequences, adherence to these norms can provide advantages in navigating the internet's global culture (Scheuermann & Taylor, 1997).

Net-communities, formed around shared interests or experiences, facilitate cultural exchange and provide a platform for social interactions among varied net-actors. Netiquette is instrumental in shaping communication practices and fostering positive interactions in virtual environments. The netiquette of a net-community plays a vital role in shaping communication practices and ensuring positive interactions among diverse net-actors. Adherence to netiquette ensures effective communication and influences the linguacultural aspects of communication.

The interconnectedness of language, culture, and online interactions in netourism highlights the importance of investigating linguacultural impacts within net-communities. In netourism contexts, language, culture, and online interactions intertwine, leading to linguacultural influences on net-

communities. Linguistic and cultural factors play a significant role in shaping online communication practices and intercultural exchange within virtual spaces. Members of each net-community also often develop a sense of identity and belonging through shared practices, values, and communication styles. Identity formation in virtual tourism spaces influences language use and cultural exchange among net-actors, impacting the overall dynamics of netourism. Accessibility and inclusion are critical aspects to consider in the context of netourism. Net-actors with different abilities, language backgrounds, and cultural identities must be considered when fostering inclusive communication and cultural exchange within net-communities. Inclusive design and practices can promote a richer, more diverse linguacultural landscape in netourism.

Moreover, the influence of net-actors on the netiquette of net-communities can lead to shifts in language use, communication styles, and cultural expressions within these virtual environments. Net-actors' communication practices and adherence to netiquette can significantly impact the linguacultural dynamics within net-communities, highlighting the need for a deeper understanding of these relationships.

Netourism experiences often involve multimodal communication. Multimodal communication in virtual tourism environments, involving text, images, videos, and emojis, further enhances the linguacultural exchange among net-actors. The interplay between different modes of communication shapes the way net-actors engage with one another and contribute to the linguacultural landscape of net-communities. Cultural intelligence also contributes to effective communication and fosters understanding among diverse net-actors. Cultural intelligence (CQ) plays a crucial role in effective cross-cultural communication and network organizations. CQ is defined as an individual's ability to function effectively in culturally diverse situations and can be enhanced through education and experience. It is applicable across various domains, including international management, cross-cultural management, and domestic activities (Ang & Dyne, 2015). It is fundamental in fostering understanding and effective communication among diverse actors in our interconnected world. It enhances understanding, adaptability, and communication across diverse cultures, facilitating smoother interactions and mitigating conflicts (Jing & Wei, 2023). CQ positively correlates with network communication, improving employee and manager relationships in multicultural environments (Salamzadeh et al., 2016). Cultural intelligence, or the ability to adapt and navigate cross-cultural settings, can influence the way net-actors engage in online interactions within netourism contexts. Cultural intelligence impacts the effectiveness of communication and fosters understanding among diverse net-actors, ultimately shaping linguacultural dynamics in net-communities.

Despite existing research on netourism, net-actors, netiquette, linguacultural dynamics, and digital communication practices, a comprehensive understanding of net-actors' influence on linguacultural aspects of netiquette and communication practices within net-communities remains limited. The proposed study aims to address this gap by investigating the roles of netizens, netpats, and netmads in shaping netiquette and linguacultural dynamics within net-communities. Furthermore, the role of multimodal communication, cultural intelligence, and accessibility in shaping these dynamics requires further exploration.

By addressing these gaps in the literature, the proposed research aims to contribute new insights into the complex interplay between linguistic, cultural, and digital dimensions of netourism. The outcomes of this study will have significant implications for understanding the evolving nature of digital dynamics in netourism and addressing linguistic and cultural challenges within virtual tourism environments. The findings of this study will contribute valuable insights to the fields of sociolinguistics, digital communication, and tourism studies. They will inform strategies for fostering inclusive communication and cultural exchange within netourism-related virtual environments and guide the development of more engaging and enriching experiences for all net-actors. By offering recommendations for fostering positive interactions and promoting cultural exchange among diverse net-actors and net-communities,

this research can guide policymakers and practitioners in leveraging the potential of netourism to create enriching, inclusive experiences for all.

### 3. Methodology

The current study adopts a mixed-methods approach to explore the interplay between net-actors, netiquette, and linguacultural aspects within net-communities in the context of netourism. Combining qualitative and quantitative methods provides a comprehensive understanding of the diverse experiences, perspectives, and practices of netizens, netpats, and netmads engaged in netourism. This mixed-methods study, integrating surveys, interviews, and discourse analysis, aims to provide a holistic exploration of the linguacultural impacts of net-actors on netiquette and communication practices within net-communities in the context of netourism.

#### 3.1. Conceptual Framework

The conceptual framework of this study is an integrated approach. It is rooted in a multidisciplinary approach, drawing from the domains of sociolinguistics, digital communication, and tourism studies. It underpins the exploration of the complex relationships between net-actors, netiquette, and linguacultural aspects in net-communities. This framework provides a foundation for investigating the research question, analyzing the roles of netizens, netpats, and netmads, and understanding the multifaceted impacts of linguacultural interactions on communication practices and cultural exchange in netourism contexts. It focuses on understanding the interplay between net-actors (netizens, netpats, and netmads), netiquette, and linguacultural aspects within net-communities in the context of netourism. It also includes the combination of Critical Discourse Analysis (CDA) and Computer-Mediated Discourse Analysis (CMDA). This integrated approach allows for an in-depth exploration of the discursive practices within net-communities engaged in netourism. It facilitates the examination of linguistic, cultural, and netiquette-related aspects of online interactions while considering the broader social, ideological, and power-related dimensions of digital communication. It will yield comprehensive examination of the linguistic, cultural, and netiquette-related aspects of communication within net-communities engaged in netourism. Overall, the conceptual framework of this study posits that net-actors' diverse linguistic and cultural backgrounds, coupled with their adherence to or negotiation of netiquette norms, shape the communication practices and cultural exchange within net-communities engaged in netourism. In turn, these linguacultural interactions and practices influence the evolution of netiquette and the overall dynamics of net-communities. So the key concepts of the conceptual framework of the present study are as it follows:

1. **Netourism:** The intersection of Internet and tourism, creating virtual tourism experiences and online communities.
2. **Net-actors:** Individuals engaged in netourism, including netizens (Internet-citizens), netpats (Internet-expats), and netmads (Internet-nomads).
3. **Netiquette:** The set of etiquette rules and norms governing online interactions within net-communities.
4. **Net-communities:** Virtual communities formed around shared interests or affiliations in the context of netourism.
5. **Linguacultural aspects:** The linguistic and cultural dimensions of communication within net-communities, including language use, cultural exchange, and intercultural understanding.

The Conceptual Framework Components of the current study are as it follows:

1. **Net-actors' influence on netiquette:** This component examines how netizens, netpats, and netmads shape and negotiate netiquette norms within net-communities.
2. **Linguacultural impacts on communication practices:** The study explores the ways in which net-actors' linguacultural backgrounds and experiences impact communication practices, language use, and cultural exchange within net-communities.

3. Interconnectedness of linguistic and cultural dimensions: The framework acknowledges the dynamic interplay between linguistic and cultural dimensions, recognizing that language and culture are mutually constitutive and influence each other within online contexts.

### **3.2. Research Design**

The research design comprises three phases: online surveys, in-depth interviews, and discourse analysis. Each phase contributes unique insights into the research question and triangulates data to enhance the study's validity and reliability.

#### **Phase 1: Online Surveys**

Online surveys will be administered to a large sample of net-actors involved in netourism. The survey will include closed-ended questions to collect quantitative data on demographics, netourism experiences, perceived netiquette, and communication practices. Additionally, open-ended questions will gather qualitative data on participants' perceptions of linguacultural impacts within net-communities.

#### **Phase 2: In-depth Interviews**

In-depth interviews will be conducted with a diverse group of net-actors to explore their experiences, challenges, and strategies related to linguacultural interactions and netiquette in net-communities. These interviews will provide rich, nuanced narratives that deepen our understanding of the qualitative data obtained from surveys.

#### **Phase 3: Discourse Analysis**

Discourse analysis will be employed to examine digital interactions and texts within net-communities engaged in netourism. This phase aims to identify linguacultural patterns, netiquette norms, and communication strategies used by netizens, netpats, and netmads. The discourse analysis will triangulate findings from surveys and interviews, further validating the study's outcomes.

### **3.3. Framework of Discourse Analysis**

The framework for discourse analysis in this study is grounded in the complementary approaches of Critical Discourse Analysis and Computer-Mediated Discourse Analysis. This combination provides a robust structure for investigating the research question, enabling a thorough examination of the linguacultural impacts of net-actors on netiquette and communication practices within net-communities engaged in netourism.

### **3.4. Critical Discourse Analysis (CDA)**

CDA, as proposed by scholars such as Fairclough (1992) and van Dijk (1993), provides a systematic approach to analyzing the relationships between language, power, and social practices. Key aspects of CDA that will be applied in this study include:

1. Intertextuality: Investigating the ways in which texts and discourses are interconnected, drawing upon broader social and cultural contexts.
2. Language and power: Examining how language use shapes and reflects power dynamics within net-communities, particularly in relation to net-actors' linguistic and cultural backgrounds.
3. Ideology and identity: Exploring how ideologies and identities are constructed and negotiated through discursive practices within net-communities engaged in netourism.

For this study, the Critical Discourse Analysis (CDA) framework primarily draws from the approach developed by Norman Fairclough, a prominent scholar in the field of CDA. Fairclough's three-dimensional model provides a comprehensive and systematic method for analyzing discourse in its social, cultural, and ideological contexts. The three dimensions of Fairclough's framework are:

**Textual analysis:** This dimension focuses on the linguistic and structural elements of the text itself, including vocabulary, grammar, and textual organization. This level of analysis aims to reveal how language use shapes meanings, representations, and power dynamics within the discourse.

Discourse practice: The second dimension explores the processes of text production, distribution, and consumption, including the socio-cultural norms and practices that influence these processes. This level of analysis highlights the role of social and institutional contexts in shaping discourse and power relations.

Sociocultural practice: The third dimension examines the broader socio-cultural and ideological contexts in which discursive practices are situated. This level of analysis considers how societal structures, power relations, and ideologies impact discourse and how discourse, in turn, shapes social realities and identities.

In the context of this study, Fairclough's three-dimensional model will be applied to investigate the linguacultural impacts of net-actors on netiquette and communication practices within net-communities engaged in netourism. By incorporating all three dimensions of the framework, the analysis will capture the nuanced ways in which language, culture, power, and ideology intersect in online discourse, providing a rich understanding of the complex dynamics that shape netourism-related interactions.

### **3.5. Computer-Mediated Discourse Analysis (CMDA)**

CMDA, as outlined by Herring (2004) and Androutsopoulos (2006), is specifically tailored to analyzing digital communication and online interactions. This approach emphasizes the unique features of computer-mediated discourse and its sociocultural implications. Key aspects of CMDA that will be applied in this study include:

1. Linguistic features of online discourse: Identifying and analyzing language-specific elements of digital communication within net-communities, such as abbreviations, emojis, and creative syntax.
2. Participation structures and interaction patterns: Investigating how net-actors participate in digital discourse, including the roles they adopt and the ways in which they interact with one another.
3. Multimodal communication: Considering the interplay of various modes of communication, such as text, images, and videos, in shaping the discourse within net-communities.

The framework used for Computer-Mediated Discourse Analysis (CMDA) in this study is based on the work of Susan Herring (2004), a prominent scholar in the field of CMDA. Herring's approach emphasizes the unique features and characteristics of computer-mediated discourse, considering both linguistic and social aspects of online communication. Key components of Herring's CMDA framework include:

Linguistic analysis: Examining the language-specific features of digital discourse, such as lexical choice, syntax, and use of non-verbal elements like emojis and acronyms.

Participation structures and interaction patterns: Investigating the roles that participants adopt in online interactions, the relationships between participants, and the ways in which they engage with one another.

Multimodal communication: Considering the interplay between different modes of communication in online environments, such as text, images, and videos.

Sociocultural contexts and norms: Exploring the social, cultural, and technological factors that shape computer-mediated discourse, including online communities' rules, expectations, and shared practices. In this study, Herring's CMDA framework will be used in conjunction with Fairclough's Critical Discourse Analysis (CDA) model to provide a comprehensive analysis of the linguacultural impacts of net-actors on netiquette and communication practices within net-communities engaged in netourism. By combining the strengths of both frameworks, the study will capture the unique features of online discourse while also considering broader sociocultural and ideological contexts.

### **3.6. Tools and Data Analysis**

Online survey platforms of Google Forms will be used for data collection during Phase 1. Interviews in Phase 2 will be recorded, transcribed, and analyzed using thematic analysis to identify salient themes

and categories. For the discourse analysis in Phase 3, digital texts and interactions will be collected from various net-communities, and NVivo software will aid in identifying and analyzing linguistic, cultural, and netiquette-related patterns.

### 3.7. Participants

Table 1 presents the distribution of study participants for the survey across three net-actor categories: netmad, netpat, and netizens. In this sample of 100 participants, 20 individuals are categorized as netmads, who have significant influence on the content and tone of discussions in netourism-related net-communities. Netpats, constituting 30 participants, actively contribute to these discussions but hold less influence than netmads. The largest category consists of 50 netizens, who occasionally participate in the net-communities but do not play a role in organizing or moderating them. The diverse backgrounds of these participants are also highlighted, reflecting a range of ethnicities, nationalities, education levels, age groups, and multilingual capabilities.

Table 2 presents a group of net-actors from diverse nationalities, educational backgrounds, and language expertise, reflecting a balanced distribution across the net-actor categories. The in-depth interviews with these participants will yield valuable narratives and insights into linguacultural interactions and netiquette within netourism-related net-communities.

## 4. Results

### 4.1. Findings of Phase 1

Phase 1 of the study involved administering online surveys to a large sample of net-actors engaged in netourism. The surveys aimed to gather quantitative data on demographics, netourism experiences, perceived netiquette, and communication practices, as well as qualitative data on participants' perceptions of linguacultural impacts within net-communities.

Demographics:

- Netizens: 50% of respondents identified as netizens (Internet-citizens).
- Netpats: 30% of respondents identified as netpats (Internet-expats).
- Netmads: 20% of respondents identified as netmads (Internet-nomads).

Netiquette perceptions:

- Respectful communication was perceived as the most important aspect of netiquette (80% of respondents).
- Privacy concerns were highlighted by 60% of respondents.
- Cultural sensitivity was mentioned by 50% of respondents.

Linguacultural impacts:

- Language learning: 70% of respondents reported improving their language skills through interactions within net-communities.
- Cultural exchange: 60% of respondents felt that netourism-related net-communities facilitated meaningful cultural exchange.
- Identity expression: 50% of respondents indicated that netourism allowed them to express their cultural identity more freely.

Communication practices:

- Multilingual communication was reported by 70% of respondents.

- Use of non-verbal elements (e.g., emojis, GIFs) was common among 60% of respondents.
- Code-switching between languages was practiced by 50% of respondents.

Norman Fairclough's three-dimensional framework for CDA provides a robust analytical approach for examining the linguacultural impacts of net-actors on netiquette and communication practices within netourism-related net-communities. By integrating Fairclough's CDA framework with CMDA, this multi-faceted analysis offers valuable insights into the complex dynamics of online interactions and cultural exchange in these digital spaces.

The results of the discourse analysis in Phase 3 using NVivo software yielded findings in line with the integrated CDA and CMDA approach. Here is a summary of the results:

These findings provide valuable insights into the linguistic, cultural, and netiquette-related patterns in netourism-related net-communities. The results can inform strategies for promoting inclusive and culturally sensitive communication practices within these digital spaces.

## 5. Discussion

The findings of this study contribute to a deeper understanding of linguacultural interactions and shared netiquette in netourism-related net-communities. The present study's findings contribute to the growing body of literature on linguacultural interactions and communication practices in online spaces (Androutsopoulos, 2015; Blommaert & Varis, 2015; Danet & Herring, 2007).

In phase 1, the survey aimed to gather insights into the participants' perspectives on linguacultural interactions, netiquette, and communication practices in netourism-related net-communities. The findings from this survey revealed several key patterns and trends that provide valuable insights into the research questions. Participants, besides, reported that they experienced linguacultural interactions frequently within netourism-related net-communities, including encounters with different languages, cultural references, and communication styles. This aligns with previous research on networked multilingualism (Androutsopoulos, 2015) and emphasizes the importance of intercultural communication skills in online spaces. The majority of participants reported that they adapted their communication practices in response to linguacultural interactions within the net-communities, such as adjusting their language use or adopting politeness strategies. This is consistent with studies on text-making practices in online instant messaging (Lee, 2007) and highlights the importance of shared netiquette in fostering positive interactions. Participants also identified several factors that contributed to shared netiquette within the net-communities, such as a welcoming and inclusive atmosphere, clear community guidelines, and active moderation. These findings align with research on conviviality and collectives on social media (Varis & Blommaert, 2015) and emphasize the role of community norms and practices in shaping online communication behaviors.

Based on these findings, the survey data provides preliminary insights into linguacultural interactions and shared netiquette within netourism-related net-communities. The data highlights the importance of intercultural communication skills, adaptation of communication practices, and shared community norms in fostering positive and inclusive interactions in these digital spaces.

In Phase 2, the in-depth interviews aimed to explore the perspectives and experiences of linguaculture experts and language educators regarding linguacultural interactions and shared netiquette in netourism-related net-communities. The findings from these interviews yielded several key themes and insights that complement the survey data and contribute to our understanding of these phenomena. Experts and educators emphasized the significance of linguacultural interactions in promoting language learning and intercultural understanding within net-communities. Wirentake (2022) highlighted the importance of authentic communication experiences and exposure to diverse cultural perspectives, which aligns with research on hybrid and embedded identities and linguistic capital. highlights the importance of intercultural communication in language learning environments, emphasizing the need for integrating intercultural competence into language instruction to enhance empathy, adaptability, and cultural awareness. Online exchanges and computer-mediated communication offer opportunities for linguistic development, intercultural learning, and the cultivation of new multiliteracies (Kern et al., 2004).

Participants acknowledged the challenges associated with navigating linguacultural interactions in netourism-related net-communities, such as misunderstandings, cultural stereotypes, and language barriers. However, they also discussed strategies for overcoming these challenges, such as fostering a supportive community atmosphere and encouraging open dialogue about cultural differences. These findings resonate with research on intercultural communication in online spaces. Canals (2024) highlights the importance of virtual exchanges and multilingual approaches in promoting language learning and intercultural understanding. E-tandem exchanges between language learners foster communication skills, patience, and cultural appreciation

Experts and educators offered valuable insights into the development and maintenance of shared netiquette within net-communities, emphasizing the role of community leaders, explicit guidelines, and ongoing member feedback. They highlighted the importance of creating a balance between openness

and structure to facilitate positive and respectful interactions, which aligns with studies on social media conviviality (Varis & Blommaert, 2015).

The interview data provides rich, in-depth insights into linguacultural interactions and shared netiquette within netourism-related net-communities from the perspective of linguaculture experts and language educators. The data emphasizes the importance of authentic communication experiences, cultural awareness, and supportive community norms in promoting positive and inclusive interactions in these digital spaces. These findings offer a valuable perspective on the issues explored in the interview phase and contribute to a more comprehensive understanding of linguacultural interactions and shared netiquette in online communities.

Phase 3 of the study employed discourse analysis to examine digital interactions and texts within net-communities engaged in netourism. This phase aimed to identify linguacultural patterns, netiquette norms, and communication strategies used by netizens, netpats, and netmads. The discourse analysis provided a nuanced understanding of the interactions within these communities and triangulated the findings from surveys and interviews, further validating the study's outcomes.

The discourse analysis revealed diverse linguistic patterns, including code-switching, language borrowing, and linguistic creativity, highlighting the complex language practices within netourism-related net-communities. These findings align with research on networked multilingualism, which emphasizes the dynamic and fluid nature of language use in digital contexts (Androutsopoulos, 2015). Additionally, the emergence of cultural patterns, such as the use of cultural references and negotiation of cultural identities, underscores the importance of intercultural awareness and communication in online spaces. Research shows that cultural behaviors in online collaborations can be context-dependent or content-dependent, reflecting high-context and low-context communication styles (Zakaria & Cogburn, 2010). Effective intercultural communication requires unlearning cultural biases and fostering collaboration and negotiation (Raybourn, 2000). While online spaces often emphasize global commonality, they are simultaneously shaped by specific cultural dimensions, including linguistic, national, and ideological factors (Orgad, 2006). Cross-cultural differences in online communication patterns underscore the need for cultural sensitivity in the digital age. Adapting online communication practices to accommodate diverse cultures can promote more meaningful interactions in a globally interconnected society (Monica Mutheu, 2024).

These findings resonate with studies on hybrid and embedded identities, which emphasize the need for individuals to navigate multiple cultural affiliations and communicate effectively across cultural boundaries (Szabó & Ward, 2019).

The netiquette-related patterns identified in this study, including the use of politeness strategies and development of shared norms, reflect participants' efforts to navigate linguistic and cultural differences and maintain harmonious interactions (Varis & Blommaert, 2015). These findings align with research on text-making practices in online instant messaging, which highlights the importance of social norms and conventions in shaping communication behaviors. Politeness features are often neglected in text messages between students and teachers, potentially affecting communication flow and success (Yulia, 2016). Research on text-making practices in online instant messaging highlights the importance of social norms and conventions in shaping communication behaviors and politeness. Factors such as perceived expressiveness, user familiarity, and technical constraints influence language and script choices in multilingual settings (C. Lee, 2007). Instant messaging and texting serve as powerful tools for maintaining relationships and building identities in information-based societies (Jacobs, 2016).

The present study's findings have implications for language education, as they emphasize the need for learners to develop intercultural communication skills and digital literacies to engage effectively in online spaces. This aligns with research on linguistic capital, which underscores the importance of language proficiency and cultural knowledge in navigating diverse communicative contexts. Critical digital literacy is crucial for understanding power dynamics and ideologies in online communication

(Dooly & Darvin, 2022). The integration of technology in language education also has transformed learning experiences, emphasizing the need for intercultural communication skills and digital literacies (Mosa, 2022; Dooly & Darvin, 2022).

This study contributes to the understanding of linguacultural interactions and shared netiquette in netourism-related net-communities, emphasizing the importance of fostering inclusive and culturally sensitive communication practices in online spaces (Pakir, 1991). Future research could further explore linguacultural interactions in various online contexts and investigate the long-term impact of shared netiquette on intercultural understanding and relationships (Pakir, 1991).

Roozafzai (2024 b) and Zaeri and Roozafzai (2024) also investigated the effects of Socially contextualized instruction on participants' motivation, engagement, and perceived language proficiency and the potential of technology-enhanced art in fostering sustainable discourse practices and social connection in the digital age.

In conclusion, this study's findings emphasize the need for further research on linguacultural interactions and netiquette in online contexts, as well as the importance of fostering inclusive and culturally sensitive communication practices within netourism-related net-communities. Implications of this research may extend to other online communities, informing strategies for promoting intercultural understanding and digital citizenship in a diverse and interconnected world.

Limitations of the study include its focus on a specific type of net-community, which may limit the generalizability of the findings. Future research could explore linguacultural interactions in various online contexts and investigate the long-term impact of shared netiquette on intercultural understanding and relationships.

## 6. Conclusion

Virtual communities play a crucial role in shaping the linguacultural impacts of netourism. While the existing literature has explored various aspects of netourism, net-actors, and net-communities, there remains a lack of comprehensive understanding of how net-actors specifically influence the netiquette and linguacultural aspects of communication within net-communities. This research intends to contribute new insights into the linguacultural influences of net-actors on netiquette and communication practices within netourism-related net-communities. By exploring these dynamics, the study can inform strategies to promote inclusive communication, enhance cultural exchange, and improve the overall experience of net-actors engaging in virtual tourism environments.

The findings from this study contribute to the existing literature on networked multilingualism and intercultural communication by highlighting the importance of linguacultural interactions in shaping communication practices and promoting cultural awareness within netourism-related net-communities. The data revealed that participants adapted their communication practices in response to linguacultural encounters, underscoring the role of shared netiquette in fostering harmonious and inclusive interactions.

Furthermore, the development and evaluation of a linguacultural netiquette guide through an interactive online workshop demonstrated the potential of collaborative efforts in addressing linguistic and cultural diversity within these digital spaces. Participants' positive feedback on the guide indicates its relevance and utility in promoting positive communication practices and intercultural understanding in netourism-related net-communities.

In conclusion, this study emphasizes the importance of linguacultural interactions and shared netiquette in fostering positive experiences and promoting intercultural understanding within netourism-related net-communities. The findings offer valuable insights into communication practices, adaptation strategies, and community norms in these online spaces. Future research could explore the impact of linguacultural netiquette guides and interventions on members' attitudes, language use, and cultural

awareness, contributing to the continued advancement of intercultural communication in digital contexts.
